


Each Tuesday night, screening of the film festival will use the same link listed above and begin promptly at 7pm.

- At 7pm, guests will be invited into the Zoom Webinar room, where we will hold a pre-screening introduction.
- After the introduction, we will post the link to the film's screening URL in the Chat box of the Zoom Webinar platform. The Chat feature is located in the "Control Bar," either at the top or bottom of your Zoom window. A notification will appear announcing that the link has been posted. When directed, select this box to bring up a new window.



- Guests will then follow the link in the Chat to screen the film on their own computers. Selecting the link will bring up an Internet browser window.
- We will make an announcement to play the film and expectations for the length of the film's runtime. Guests are invited to come back to the Zoom Webinar at the conclusion of the film's runtime. We will give you an expectation for a specific time to rejoin the Zoom Webinar.
- Please leave your Zoom Webinar open and in the background during this time. Be aware that while you will have the ability to pause and resume play of the film at your leisure, we are only allowing for a five-minute buffer before the post-screening discussion. If you close your Zoom Webinar window, you will have to rejoin the Zoom Webinar to participate in the post-screening discussion.

After the film has completed its runtime, guests are invited to return to the Zoom Webinar room to participate in a post-screening discussion using the Q&A feature. Submit questions by writing them in the Q&A box.

TANZANIA



Tanzania: The Royal Tour (2022)

Written & Directed by: John Feist

An intimate and personal travel documentary, Tanzania: The Royal Tour, reveals the sprawling nation through the eyes of Dr. Samia Suluhu Hassan, president of Tanzania. "Mama Samia" (as she is affectionately called) and Emmy Award-winning journalist Peter Greenberg journey across incredibly varied geography, showcasing the history, culture, environment, food, music, and economy of a diverse and remarkable country. From the modern capital city of Dar es Salaam, to the Arabic influenced islands of Zanzibar, to the "Roof of Africa" (Mt. Kilimanjaro), to the "endless plains" of the Serengeti (home of the Maasai), the film tells the stories of just some of Tanzania's amazing hidden gems.

We visit the UNESCO World Heritage Site of Stone Town, learn about the Indian Ocean slave trade and the emergence of Swahili culture. We see the rural school and mosque where President Hassan spent her formative years. We are treated to examples of the growing ecotourism industry (including an underwater lodge). We

come to visually understand the immensity of the poaching problem that led to a 60 percent decrease in the elephant population. We discover a tricky way to experience the 19,340 foot summit of Mt. Kilimanjaro and see firsthand the impact of climate change. We descend three miles into a Tanzanite mine, the heavily guarded and solitary mine that yields the world's rarest gem. We go on safari in the Ngorongoro Crater (to observe "the Big Five") and in the Serengeti (by balloon) and visit a Maasai village to appreciate their traditions. By the end of the film, you will want to plan your own epic trip to Tanzania!

Tanzania: The Royal Tour is part of a groundbreaking series of television specials, produced and hosted by Peter Greenberg — America's most recognized, honored, and respected front-line travel news journalist — showcasing nations in a way no visitor has ever seen them before. Each "royal tour" is guided by some of the

most dynamic and powerful heads of state, taking us deep inside each country to offer access to extraordinary locations, historic landmarks, and cultural experiences. Other countries in the series include: Mexico, Ecuador, Israel, Rwanda, and Poland. Greenberg also hosts the public television show *The Travel Detective* which provides half-hour episodes that seek to empower audiences with travel news, must-have information, insider tips, and hidden destinations not found in traditional guidebooks or brochures. Her Excellency Ambassador, Dr. Elsie Sia Kanza. Ambassador from the United Republic of Tanzania

Between 2002 and 2006, Elsie S. Kanza, a Tanzanian economist, served in various positions in the Ministry of Finance and Central Bank of Tanzania, including personal assistant economic advisor to His Excellency Jakaya Mrisho Kikwete of the United Republic of Tanzania. She joined the World Economic Forum in 2011 and has been engaged in changing the narrative of the African economy. In 2014, she became the Head of Africa, and member Executive Committee, World Economic Forum. She was named one of Pan-Africa's continent leading women 2020 by *Forbes*.

Kanza was born and raised in Kenya by Tanzanian parents. She began her education in Kenya before proceeding to the U.S., where she graduated with a bachelor's degree from the United States International University-Africa in business administration. She also earned a master's degree in finance from the University of Strathclyde, United Kingdom, and a master's degree in development economics,

An Emmy award-winning investigative reporter and producer, CBS News Travel Editor Peter Greenberg is America's most recognized, honored, and respected front-line travel news journalist, reporting from more than 152 countries. Greenberg also produces and co-hosts an ongoing series of acclaimed public television specials, *The Royal Tour*, featuring personal, one-on-one journeys through countries with the heads of state, ranging from the King of Jordan to the Prime Minister of New Zealand; the President of Rwanda to the Prime Minister of Israel; the Presidents of Mexico and Peru; the Prime Ministers of Poland and Jamaica, to name a few.

The latest is *Royal Tour: the President of Tanzania*. In addition, Greenberg hosts the long-running public television series, *The Travel Detective*. This investigative news magazine offers cutting-edge travel information and insider tips, plus in-depth reports on the good, bad, and yes, even ugly, aspects of travel.

HIDDEN is the latest series, with a specific editorial mandate: no gift shops, tour buses, or glossy brochures. HIDDEN reveals the little known but incredible experiences in special destinations around the world that are accessible to the audience. Recent specials include Turkey, Canary Islands, Poland, Saudi Arabia, amd Ireland.

Each week, Greenberg hosts the CBS News three-hour national radio show, Eye on Travel, broadcast from a different remote location around the world. Greenberg is also author of the New York Times best-selling travel detective series, including The Best Places For Everything, Don't Go There! and The Complete Travel Detective Bible.

Travel Weekly named Greenberg one of the most influential people in travel, along with Bill Marriott and Richard Brandon. Greenberg's most recent Emmy award was for his work on the Dateline team reporting on Miracle on the Hudson.

His website, PeterGreenberg.com, is one of the leading travel news resources for consumers and industry insiders alike. When he is not traveling the globe, Greenberg serves as an active volunteer firefighter in New York.

ARMENIA

The American Good Samaritans (2022)



The American Good Samaritans examines the unimaginable atrocities of the Armenian genocide — and the American diplomats, health professionals, actors, and religious leaders, who helped save countless lives. The Armenian genocide most commonly refers to the pogroms perpetrated by the Ottoman Empire during the early years of World War I.

A more complex history considers



a 30-year timespan (1894–1924) when Christian minorities were systematically eliminated by the pan-Islamic policies of the Empire. The Hamidian massacres of the mid-1890s resulted in 100,000–300,00 deaths and 50,000 orphaned children. The Adana massacre of 1909 killed 25,000 ethnic Armenians and destroyed half of the city. The World War I genocide (starting in Constantinople with "Red Sunday" on 24 April 1915) saw 1,000,000 Armenians murdered, primarily through death marches to the Syrian Desert. The Turkish War of Independence (1919–1923) massacred nearly 100,000 Armenians.

These events put an end to more than 2,000 years of Armenian civilization in the region. Thirty-four countries (including the United States) now formally recognize this extermination of a ethnic group as the largest and most thorough "racial cleansing" until World War II. Reportedly, the Nazis incorporated the lessons of the Armenian genocide into its own tactics against the Jews. Turkey continues to deny this history

and attempts to limit any recognition or mention of the genocide in the global community.

Notwithstanding, The American Good Samaritans is a story about survival; the film is dedicated "to the memory of those who



devoted their lives to saving nations, as gratitude from the side of survived nations." Produced by Manvel Saribekyan with the support of the National Cinema Center of Armenia, the film is the second in a series of documentaries ("The Map of Gratitude" project) that gives testament to the international humanitarians who helped the Armenian people (the first film, *The Map of Salvation*, is about European missionaries and the third film, *The Golden Chain of Mercy*, is about ANZAC soldiers).

Our guide through the film is the late Swedish-Americans Associate Professor of Holocaust History and Genocide Studies, Dr. Paul Levine. He and other experts recount important people — from Clara Barton (founder of the American Red Cross) to Ambassador Henry Morgenthau to missionaries Elizabeth Webb, Elizabeth Barrows, and Clarence Ussher to US Consul Leslie Davis to Jackie Coogan (the famous child actor) to Pastor Asa Jennings, who provided vital assistance to a population nearing obliteration. Using a narrator, archival footage and stills, numerous interviews, historical letters, and reenactments, *The American Good Samaritans* resurfaces a forgotten story that needs to become common knowledge in world history. The film was shot in six countries (the United States, Armenia, Lebanon, Greece, Turkey, and Iran), participated in 98 international film festivals, and won 135 prestigious awards. ICELAND



Svar við bréfi Helgu (2022) [A Letter from Helga]

Set in the remote Strandir area of the Westfjords during the 1940s, A Letter From Helga contrasts Iceland's stark landscape with the inescapable complexity of human desire. There may be little to see on the region's cold surface but underneath lies a bubbling caldron of obsession, grief, longing, and despair. Much like the country's foundational magma, these repressed emotions always threaten to erupt. And when these hidden passions do emerge, they are revealed by a combination of silence, aching looks and touches, heated arguments, and violence.

Two externally "perfect" couples in a small sheep farming community become entangled in rumors, questionable choices, and misbegotten love. Employing some thematic tropes from classical melodrama, the film explores emotional turmoil,

sacrifices made for children, ties to tradition, self-imposed isolation, and an inability to recognize the consequences of one's actions. Bjarni (Thor Kristjansson) and his wife Unnar (Anita Briem) share a hollow, childless marriage brought about by an unspoken tragedy. Helga (Hera Hilmar) and her husband Hallgrímur (Björn Thors) have two lovely children but share nothing in common other than disappointment. Because of their love of literature and poetry, Bjarni and Helga begin a not quite secret love affair. But even their renewed passion reveals a major conflict: Bjarni wants to remain on his family farm while Helga wants to experience the modernity of Reykjavik.

A Letter from Helga also exposes us to some seminal Norwegian and Icelandic literature, not surprisingly since Hjörleifsdóttir holds a BA in Comparative Literature from the University of Iceland and the Sorbonne (she also earned an MA in filmmaking from Columbia University). Some of the works discussed in the community book club readings are: Pan by Knut Hamsun; Vonir by Einar Hjörleifsson Kvaran; and The Black Cliffs by Gunnar Gunnarsson. Each story is echoed in the film itself, an adaptation of Bergsveinn Birgisson's novella (Reply to a Letter from Helga). The book and the film roil with ardor, guilt, and regret about choices made and paths left unexplored. It is a sensitive film offering universal themes of hope and loss, desire and regret, and the wonder of having looked into the eyes of someone who loves you deeply — if fleetingly. It has been said that Icelandic love stories are never simple and that's certainly true here. The narrative is complex and sophisticated and ultimately asks if we should sacrifice everything for love.

A Letter from Helga is Hjörleifsdóttir's second feature film and appeared in 17 international film festivals. It received 12 Edda Award nominations including Best Actor, Actress, Director, Screenplay, and Cinematography. Anita Briem (Unnur) won Best Supporting Actress and Björn Thors (Hallgrímur) won Best Supporting Actor. Jasper Wolf's stunning cinematography makes the cliffs, fields, and coast of Iceland an important metaphor for the characters' internal turmoil.

UNITED STATES


Bombers & Masterpieces: Recovering the Life, Art, and Diary of Rene Gimpel — (2022)

The documentary mosaic recounts the life, times, and diary of Rene Gimpel, an important Jewish art dealer and friend of nearly all major French artists of the first half of the 20th century. He was also a resistance fighter, who died in the Neuengamme concentration camp.



Not only did the Nazis take Rene Gimpel's life, they stole famous works of art from him. The film also describes his legacy and his heirs' ongoing efforts to recover artworks stolen by the Nazis.
